Welcome to the May edition of the Messenger! Now that Barry has left, there will be a series of "guest editors" for our newsletter, and it seems appropriate to begin with the churchwardens.

"To everything there is a season - a time to be born and a time to die, a time to plant and a time to uproot ... a time to tear down and a time to build..."

As a church we are celebrating the season of Eastertide and, at the time of writing, we are looking forward to Ascension Day and Pentecost, the promise and arrival of the Holy Spirit. This year at St John's, we have also entered another new season – that of interregnum or vacancy, as Barry moves on and we look ahead to what God is going to do next in our church.

Interregnum does not mean standing still; the vicarage may be vacant but the church is not! St John's is still at work, and so is God. Sunday and weekday services will continue as before; we are so grateful that God has given us Ajay to provide continuity, and we ask you to support him in your prayers as he takes on an increased preaching load. Over the coming months, we will also have visiting preachers and celebrants, as well as lay preachers from within our own church family.

The weekly life of the church – concerts, visiting groups, events for St Jerome's school etc – will also continue, and we are very grateful to those church members who have volunteered to make sure the church is accessible and/or secure so that these important activities can go ahead.

So what will be different about being in interregnum? The visible difference is that there is more to do to keep things going!

Ajay, the churchwardens, Simon and Tina in particular are going to be very busy (see next paragraph to find out more) and we will need your prayers and your practical help too. This is a fantastic time to offer to join the coffee rota, to learn how to help with the AV or to help out with the children's work, and to join in with many other tasks (opportunities!) which will spread the load a bit.

What about what you don't see? What will be happening behind the scenes? Well, the process for finding a new Vicar has already begun! We (Peter and Cath) have already met with Bishop Lusa, who is very enthusiastic about helping us find the right person for the next chapter in the story of St John's.

On May 9th the whole PCC will meet with Catherine Pickford, the Archdeacon, to discuss where we are as a church, where we want to be, and who we need to help us make that journey. We are preparing a parish profile (a bit like an ecclesiastical dating agency!) which, when completed, will be published and circulated to prospective candidates. From this the selection process begins; interested clergy will be invited to visit: there will be interviews and a lot of prayer, and with God's guidance and blessing we will find our new vicar, and they will find us. This is not a speedy process; the Bishop thinks we should expect at least a year of interregnum. But that is a good thing! It gives us time and space to think and pray about our church family life, so that our new Vicar joins a church that is already on the move.

God makes this promise in the book of Joel: "And afterward, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your old men will dream dreams, your young men will see visions." That's us; we are God's sons and daughters in this place (we don't need to be too picky about who is young or old, and "men" is non-gender-specific here!) As a church we need to bring our dreams and visions to this time of interregnum. Dreams are the memories of God's goodness to us here in the past – not that we hanker for the good old days, or to return to how things were back in the day, but that we are confident that God has always had us in his hand and that he has done amazing things here. Visions are the hopes and ideas for what could be – what God wants to do in us and through us. These are things that have never been, but that does not mean that they can't happen.

One very practical and visible opportunity is the building work, which is beginning as we write. Soon we will have a dedicated café, meeting space and accessible toilets - yes, more than one! The possibilities that the annexe offers are enormous, not just for us as a worshipping community but for others coming into the building to use our spaces and our facilities. We are surrounded by new buildings and new families, and we have the real opportunity to become a hub for them and a place where community can happen. Once this building work has progressed to a certain point, we will be able to return developing our existing kitchen to space with improved catering facilities and all the potential that this will bring.

We ask for your prayers that the work will go smoothly, and also for your patience with any changes to the usual routines or arrangements of the church during the building work; we do not anticipate major or extended disruption to Sunday services, but we may all need to be a bit flexible at times.

St Jerome's sits squarely in our parish and we have a good relationship with them; the school is now "all grown up" with pupils from Reception to Year 6, and they are already making good use of our church for school events and special services. Many of our Messy Church families discovered us through St Jerome's, and it is exciting to think about ways to develop the relationship between the church and the school.

Bishop Lusa has asked us to think about where we want to be as a church in 10 years' time, and for those dreams/visions to shape our search for the person to help us make that journey. We would love to know your dreams and visions for St John's; they could be small scale or huge, instant or long term, small steps or giant leaps, subtle or radical or downright revolutionary! Please write down or tell us your thoughts so that we can bring them prayerfully to the process of finding our new Vicar and also to the process of allowing God to reshape St John's as he sees fit. *"To everything there is a season - a time to be born and a time to die, a time to plant and a time to uproot ... a time to tear down and a time to build..."*

This is the place where we invite people to meet Jesus – the man who healed and who taught, the man who drew children to him and who tipped over tables, the man who welcomed the unwelcome and introduced them to their Father in Heaven. We have to invite him to do those things here, with us and through us.

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." (Jeremiah 29:11)
